Contemporary poet and U.C.C. minister and professor Ruth Duck was working on an adaptation of *Rise Up, O Men of God* when, she writes, "this new hymn text came to me, as if the new wine of the faith I wanted to express would not fit into the old wineskin of the earlier text." The tune by William Henry Walter was published in 1872. Walter was organist at Presbyterian and Episcopal churches in Newark, and at Columbia University.

Eleanor Farjeon was an English Roman Catholic who wrote nursery rhymes and singing games for children. Her text first appeared in a section of the 1928 *Oxford Book of Carols* on modern texts adapted to traditional tunes. The French carol tune was earlier a setting for *Shepherds, Shake Off Your Drowsy Sleep*. The organist, choirmaster, composer and hymnal editor Martin Shaw wrote the harmony.

The remainder of his life was devoted to service to the poor, the sick, and little children. Most of his writings and translations were during this period.



## **FIRST LESSON**

### **Philippians 4:4-7**

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

## **SECOND LESSON**

### **Luke 3:7-18**

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire." And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire." So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.
