OPENING WORDS (responsive)

God is our refuge and strength

A very present help in trouble.

Therefore we will not fear.

Draw near and call on the Lord.

***HYMN** *Praise Ye the Lord, the Almighty* **482**

The text's author, Joachim Neander, took the Calvinist faith seriously but also lived a "rather unruly existence" before his pastor and others influenced him to make some changes in his life. In 1674 he became a grammar school headmaster. 66 of his hymn texts were published in 1691. The valley Neanderthal, where he took long walks, was named in his honor (and was where the famous skeleton was discovered 200 years later in 1856). The tune may have had secular origins but was used by J.S. Bach in three cantatas and an organ setting, as well as Neander's hymn.

FIRST LESSON Jeremiah 31:31-34 p. 642

***HYMN** *How Happy Is Each Child of God* **239**

The text is a paraphrase of Psalm 128 by Dwyn M. Mounger. While a pastor in Valdosta, Georgia, Mounger tried to remain faithful to the Common Lectionary's choice of Psalms and scripture lessons for Sundays. There were psalms that *The Hymnbook* (1955) did not have either to be read responsively or to be sung. He and his associate began to paraphrase the psalms and set them to familiar tunes. This text was one of those paraphrases. It became a favorite of the congregation and was sung on Christian Family Sunday every year.

SERMON How the World Will End

***HYMN** *Holy Spirit, Truth Divine* **321**

This text was written by Samuel Longfellow and first published in his *Hymns of the Spirit* (1864), where it was subtitled "The Holy Spirit Desired." Samuel Longfellow (1819-1892) was born in Portland, ME and educated at Harvard College and Divinity School. He was ordained a Unitarian minister and served in churches in Fall River, MA; Brooklyn, NY; and Germantown, PA. The intervening years he spent as a freelance preacher, writer, and editor. His intermittent pastorates were caused largely by poor health. Longfellow moved to "Craigie House" to write the *Life of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow* (1886), his older brother, and *Final Memorials of H.W. Longfellow* (1887).

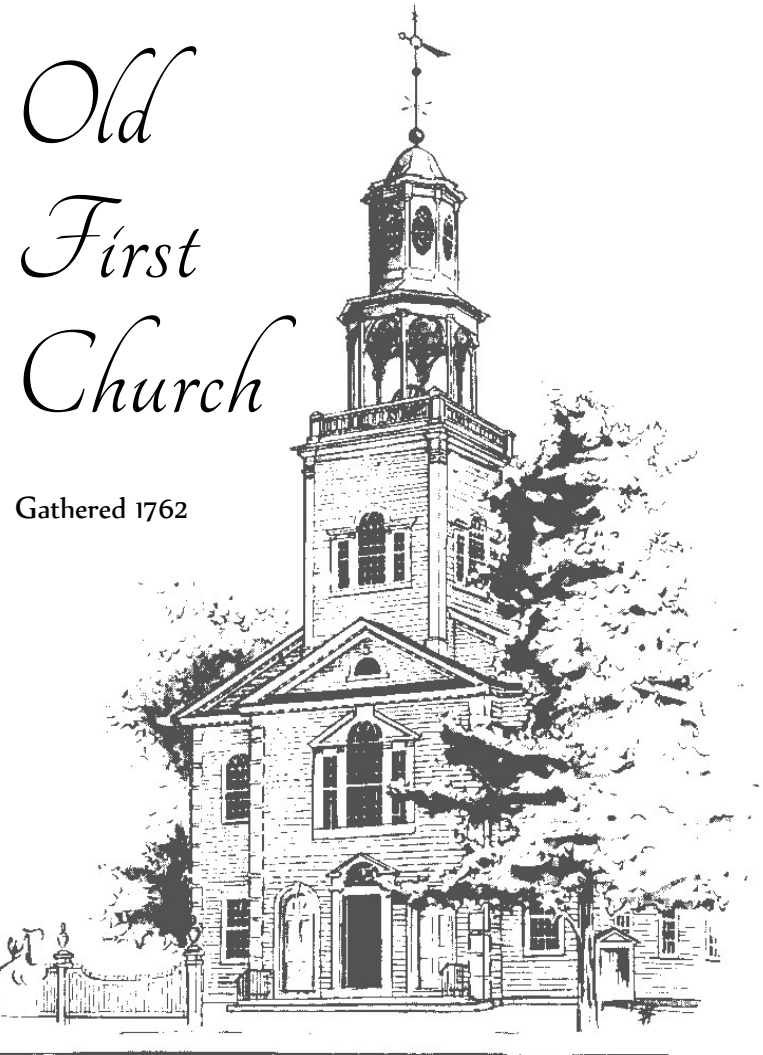
Please join us after worship today at the Barn (1 Monument Circle) for our annual Harvest Meal.

FIRST LESSON

Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

SECOND LESSON

Mark 10:46-52

They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.
