Edward Perronet (author of verses 1-3) was an Anglican priest who supported the Methodist movement, then, breaking with Wesley over the administration of Communion, became a Congregational pastor. John Rippon (author and reviser of verses 2-4) was pastor of a Baptist Church, also in England. The composer, Oliver Holden, was a carpenter who helped rebuild Charleston, MA after it was burned by the British after the Battle of Bunker (or Breed's) Hill. He was also a realtor, conducted singing schools, and was a state representative. He wrote the tune for this text just after the birth of his first daughter.

This paraphrase of Psalm 65 first appeared in The Psalter (1912), a publication of a joint committee of nine churches representing the Reformed tradition in the U.S. and Canada. The tune is an old one, by Melchior Vulpius, in 1609. He was the leading German composer of his day, a schoolmaster and musicologist, composing over 200 motets and 400 hymns for Lutheran worship.

The text by Matthew Bridges was published in 1851. Bridges was brought up in the Church of England but became a Roman Catholic during the Oxford Movement, and spent much of his life in Quebec. The tune was written for this text by George Elvey in 1868 and named using the Greek word for crowns (diademata). Elvey was a prominent organist and composer and taught several members of the royal family.



Ephesians 1:15-23

Luke 24:44-53

Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you—that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem.
